ANNUAL CLEAN UP

Our members will once again gather at the East Providence Water Pollution Control Facility on Crest Avenue in Riverside to clean up the shoreline.

We will meet on Saturday, April 6 at 9:00 am and work thru 12:00 pm while the tide is low.

The city will provide gloves, water and trash bags. The rain date is Saturday, April 20. This will be our fifth time doing this community event along with United Water.

We are looking for a good turnout in order to show our commitment to our community of East Providence and the shoreline of Narragansett Bay.

NEW STORM WINDOWS AND DOORS

One of the main concerns about the condition of the lighthouse was the intrusion of water into the structure from the windows. A study was done and a decision was made to install new windows Working with the Lizotte Glass Company, a plan to use a new line of aluminum windows was brought before the State Preservation Commission. The Commission however did not approve of the use of aluminum replacement windows preferring

refurbishing the original windows so that the original fabric of the building stay in place.

It was important, in the meantime, to tighten up the building,



so storm windows were proposed to correct the water problem. Again working with the Lizotte Glass Company, new aluminum storm windows were approved by the commission. They were approved by the Preservation Commission since the storm windows would protect the original inside wooden windows.

The windows were ordered in early November in hopes that they could be installed before the winter weather.

Mother Nature began her winter mode but did give us a couple of mild days in early January. That allowed Joe Estrella to take out a crew of four workers from Lizotte Glass to install the windows.

Also two new fiberglass doors were installed that will help improve the overall appearance and security of

the building. The job was accomplished in three days, with a fourth day used to remove all the old storm windows and doors.

PROVIDENCE BOAT SHOW

For the first time, members participated in the annual Providence Boat Show. It was held in the Providence Convention Center on Friday, January 18th through Sunday, January 20th. The Board of the Friends of Pomham Rocks Lighthouse decided to participate in order to have more publicity for our lighthouse to the general public.

Joe Estrella made a new bulletin board for our booth and Dave Kelleher printed out thirty 8x10" colored photos of various events and stages of restoration of the lighthouse. We had a continuous showing of three of our PowerPoint programs on a screen on the back curtain of the booth.

TALK ON CLIMATE CHANGE

Dr. John Merrill, a professor of Oceanography at the University of Rhode Island, will be giving a talk on Climate Change at the April meeting of the Friends of Pomham Rocks Lighthouse.

Dr. Merrill earned his BA in Physics from the University of California-Berkeley, received an MS in Physics from the University of Illinois and his PhD in Atmospheric Science from the University of Colorado at Boulder.

At URI, he teaches a graduate course in Climate Change. He also teaches some under-graduate courses in Oceanography and is an advisor to graduate students.

Climate Change is being addressed worldwide and should be of interest to the audience.

The meeting will be on Thursday, April 25th at the Riverside Public Library, 475 Bullocks Point Avenue, Riverside. The meeting will start at 6:30 pm. The public is invited to attend.

NEW POWERPOINT PROGRAM

At the Annual Meeting of the Friends of Pomham Rocks Lighthouse in November, a PowerPoint program about the History of the Pomham Rocks Lighthouse was presented by David Kelleher and Lester Nathan.

David and Lester have been working on this program since April 2012 and the result was well received by the membership.

The program was divided into sections concerning the various personnel that lived in the lighthouse.

The program began with a brief history of the construction of the buildings in 1871 and then described the times of the five keepers and their families. The Coast Guard years were then chronicled followed by the years that the lighthouse was occupied by the Charbonneau and Allen families. The Mobil Oil purchase was described and finally the partnership with the American Lighthouse Foundation.

The program will be available for presentations to the public during the coming years. The first one is scheduled for 1:00 pm on April 9 at the Forever Young Club at St. Brendan Church.

A SPARK LIGHTS A PASSION FOR LIGHTHOUSES

When Alex Dias was in fifth grade at the Waddington School, he enjoyed a presentation about Rhode Island lighthouses given by David Kelleher. This began his interest in lighthouses. Alex is now a senior at East Providence High School. When it was time to choose a topic for his senior project, he chose Rhode Island Lighthouses.

Working with David Kelleher as his mentor, he did intensive research, went on the Save The Bay tour of 21 lighthouses and sites, visited Block Island to tour its two lighthouses, visited Pomham Rocks Lighthouse and went to a number of other lighthouses on the Rhode Island mainland. He made a large poster with photos he had taken on his trips and made an excellent model of the no longer existing Bullocks Point Lighthouse. It is 5 feet long, 4.6 feet tall and 31 inches wide, made of foam board and 1,500 popsicle sticks.

He received much praise for his work from the judges on his project and the model was displayed in City Hall during the months of February and March.

Their final report contained the following elements: History/Historical and Architectural Significance, Existing Conditions, Applicable Regulations, Proposed Use, Rehabilitation Plan and Cost Estimates.

Thanks to Mike Tripp, the students were taken out to the lighthouse for their examination and study. The students worked closely with Dave Kelleher and Lester Nathan. They compiled an excellent list of historical information and a gallery of old pictures, which they presented to FPRL for our future studies and projects.

The students produced plans for using the property as a museum and a classroom for a number of nautical topics.

They produced a PowerPoint program which they presented to their fellow graduate students, their instructor and invited guests.
