ANNUAL MEETING 2014

Friends of Pomham Rocks Lighthouse held its annual meeting at a new place this time: Madeira Restaurant on Warren Avenue. Originally the dinner was to be at the new Madeira on the Waterfront – same owner, same menu – but a situation arose four days before the event resulting in our move to the Warren Avenue site.

During the business portion of the evening Treasurer Mike Tripp gave the financial statement and membership chair Jean Zunda reported 95 memberships comprised of 148 people – a record high for our organization. Joe Estrella reported on the year's restoration and maintenance that included his design, construction, and installation of an addition to the existing dock. This addition will allow our launch access to the island regardless of the tide. On the island itself the old fence was replaced and the original window refurbishing was completed and the windows reinstalled with the help of Bill Lizotte Architectural Glass & Aluminum. Time was also spent explaining the ideas of Vision3 for restoring the interior that included some examples and samples brought along for the evening.

And while we normally do not schedule entertainment at our meetings, this year Joe Estrella gave an impromptu report of his efforts in acquiring his 100-ton captain's license. (Yes, he can now legally captain the Staten Island Ferry!) By the time he was through describing everything that happened during his qualifying exam, he had all of us laughing our heads off! A NOTE FROM DAVE KELLEHER

Thank you to all members of the Event Committee for a successful year of events. It was a pleasure working with each of you as chair of the committee.

2015 ANNUAL LIGHTHOUSE GALA

The American Lighthouse Foundation held its Annual Lighthouse Gala on May 2nd at the Portsmouth Sheraton Harborside Hotel and Conference Center in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. Attendees were greeted by Bob Trapani, Executive Director of the American Lighthouse Foundation.

Following a buffet dinner, the members listened to a presentation by Fred Mikkelsen. Mr. Mikkelsen, a Coast Guard Engineman 3rd class, retired, who, at eighteen years old, was assigned to Conimicut Light Station in Rhode Island. He gave a brief history of the light and also discussed its connection to Nayatt Point Light in Barrington.

He spoke of his many experiences at the station; about his flying a kite that remained aloft for two whole days and what it was like feeling the lighthouse moving about during Hurricane Donna in 1960. At the height of the storm, the surging sea blocked all sunlight through the galley windows on the first level. When he went to the lantern to check the light, he became aware that the lighthouse was moving in the storm, with the greatest movement near the top. "It would bang you against the wall," he said, "and you had to hang on to the handrail of the ladder." He narrated the tragic story of a keeper's morose wife who, in 1922, poisoned herself and her two sons. Only one son survived.

He explained in detail some of the equipment used during his tenure there. When fog rolled in, a Fog Bell Striker was put to work. The machine had to be maintained, oiled and cleaned. It ran about two hours on 10 minutes of winding. The bell would strike automatically every 10 seconds, but inside the tower the noise of the striking machine was louder than the bell itself. When the striker stopped, "the silence would wake me from a sound sleep," he recalled.

Bob Trapani then introduced the 2015 Len Hadley Volunteerism Awards We are proud to announce our recipient is Anne Greene. Bob read a description of the way Anne has contributed to our lighthouse over the last eleven years.





TOUCH-A-TRUCK

On May 2nd FPRL participated in this East Providence Chamber of Commerce fundraiser. For those of you who have never been to one, a Touch-a-Truck event consists of a collection of as many motorized vehicles as can fit into the location it is to be held. This year there were more than thirty vehicles.

Children are invited to examine the trucks inside and out. Usually the kids are able to run the police car sirens and sound horns from the various vehicles - the noisier the better! Ambulances and fire trucks are very popular because of their potential noise factor. FPRL brings its red boat to the event and, while not one of the noisier exhibits, still attracts a large number of children; especially the smaller ones. There is a ladder for them to climb (with help) in and out of the boat which is sitting on its trailer and they get a kick out of posing with Keeper, our mascot, a life size golden retriever stuffed animal. Several days later, the launch was put in the water. It is now moored behind Madeira on the Waterfront.

SPRING PROGRAM

The spring program featured Tom Kutcher from Save the Bay. He gave us insight into what that organization is all about, what it is currently focused on, and a recap of any advances or roadblocks it has encountered. Tom leads the Narragansett Baykeeper program, which is Save The Bay's on-the-water advocacy and watchdog presence.

Save The Bay is one of largest independent non-profit environmental organizations in New England, dedicated to the protection, restoration, and improvement of the ecological health of Narragansett Bay, its watershed, and adjacent coastal waters.

The Narragansett Baykeeper is a licensed program of the Waterkeeper Alliance, a network of more than 200 similar programs worldwide.

Some interesting facts from Tom's excellent presentation:

The sea level has risen ten inches since the 1920's. Sea grass stays level with the mean high tide. Sea levels have risen so fast lately that the grasses cannot acclimate to the higher level. The sea is now drowning the grasses. The grasses are used by shellfish and small fish as a hiding spot as they grow larger.

Hopefully, in the next 5-8 years, there will spots along the Upper Bay clean enough to allow swimming.
